

Pastor Put To Work In Jail As Shipping Clerk

MILWAUKEE, March 23.—(AP)—

The Rev. Finis Dake, former Zion, Ill., minister serving a six-month sentence in the house of correction, has been put to work as a shipping clerk.

Outside of work hours he keeps to himself, and on one occasion said: "I am perfectly content here," according to Deputy Inspector John Drewniak.

Dake was convicted of Mann act violation in taking a Kenosha school girl on trips to other states. He testified in federal court he had only tried to find work for her.

He works seven hours daily wrapping parcels. Prison guards say he is a good workman. He devotes most of his spare time to theological studies, declining to mingle with the other prisoners.

"He is subjected to the same discipline and the same treatment as the rest of the inmates, and he is adjusting himself to the rules and behaving himself very well," Drewniak said.

He conducts no services at the institution.
